This conference, facilitated by Professor Peter Haslund, Director of International and Global Studies Program at Santa Barbara City College, features internationally known experts speaking on the unplanned effects of armed conflict and their impact on civilian populations and their environments.

9:00-10:15 a.m. Keynote Speaker – Dr. Richard Falk

Our Keynote Speaker will discuss the aftermaths of wars from a historical perspective. Dr. Falk is the Albert Milbank Professor Emeritus of International Law and Practice at Princeton University and Visiting Distinguished Professor of Global Studies at the University of California, Santa Barbara. He serves as the chair of the Nuclear Age Peace Foundation and is a recipient of the UNESCO Peace Education Prize. He has published 40 books on international law. His latest book is *The Great Terror War*.

Speakers will include **John Stoessinger**, Ph.D. Harvard University, Distinguished Professor of International Affairs, San Diego University and University of California at San Diego. Nationally recognized political analyst/Lecturer; **Frank Gibney**, President of the Pacific Basin Initiative and Professor of Politics at Pomona College, and **Mark Juergensmeyer**, Ph.D. University of California, Berkeley, Director of Global and International Studies and Professor in the Global Studies Program and Departments of Sociology and Religious Studies at UCSB.

12:30-2:05 p.m. Refugees - Living Casualties of War

Speakers will include **Janet Reineck**, Ph.D., Anthropologist and International Aid Worker, who lived in Kosova in 1981-1997, first conducting research, later coordinating relief and community development programs for Oxfam, the International Rescue Committee and the Soros Foundation; **Christopher Brady**, Program Development and Evaluation Manager for Direct Relief International, whose experience includes projects in a number of countries, including Mozambique and Bolivia; and **Kate Rath** from the International Rescue Committee in Los Angeles. The session will also include refugee testimonies and information on refugee rights and international efforts to meet their immediate and long-term needs from the office of the UN High Commissioner on Refugees.
